NEW LEGO DISCOVERY CENTER NOW OPEN

The highly anticipated Lego Discovery Center opened its doors at Springfield Town Center in August. The 32,000-square-foot attraction marks Lego's first discovery center in the D.C. area. The attraction features an area for kids to create and build with LEGO bricks, a Mini-World that features LEGO creations made from more than a 1.5 million bricks, a train ride through a LEGO world with game and models, a creative lab, a 4D theater and a workshop where master builders display their creations. Tickets start at \$28.99 with online ticket purchases recommended.

ROSE HILL PLAZA DEVELOPMENT PROPOSAL

Our six-decade-old Rose Hill Shopping Center, or Rose Hill Plaza, is still proposed for redevelopment, however, the proposal continues to remain in Tier 3 of the 2023 Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan amendment, meaning the project is deferred to complete more community feedback. In August, Franconia District Supervisor Rodney Lusk asked the owner of Rose Hill Plaza to l ower the number of residential units and increase retail space in its next redevelopment proposal. Lusk says he anticipates a new proposal, a subsequent staff review and a public meeting to take place this fall or early winter. Hear more from Supervisor Lusk.

IT'S LEAF SEASON. LET'S CLEAN THEM UP

Every year, without fail, the leaves fall from the trees, especially in our community where we are surrounded by so many acres of woods. Every year, we gather them up, place them in paper bags or reusable containers, and put the containers out on trash day. Our homes and streets look neater, people are less likely to slip on the wet leaves, and we prevent clogged storm drains. Fairfax County provides free pickup service of our leaf bags (and any yard waste) each week between March 1 – December 24.

Which tool gets the job done best? The most basic, cheapest, and environmentally-friendly option is a rake. Leaf blowers are another option, either gas or electric. Like many choices, there are pros and cons to each. In a community such as ours, where we live so close to our neighbors, it is worth noting that not only are some options *louder* than others, but some are also *more toxic* than others (and you can probably guess which). While the old gas operated leaf blowers are fast and efficient, their two-stroke engines are bad for human health and the environment. Cleaner electric models are improving their efficiency and while they're still a little slower, they are quieter and don't pose the health risks of the two-stroke engine gas models. They are worth a look! Lastly, the old-fashioned rake option is the quietest and cleanest of all. Yes, you will spend more time getting the leaves up and bagged. But you will get some great exercise, and the neighbors will appreciate it. The wildlife around us will be better off as well.

CAR TAX PAYMENTS ARE DUE

Personal property taxes, better known as car taxes, were due on October 5. On average, car tax bills increased by 33% this year. Keep in mind, you may qualify for tax relief if you are at least 65 years old, or permanently and totally disabled, and meet the income and asset eligibility requirements. DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME: DON'T FORGET TO FALL BACK

We've been on daylight saving time since March 12, and reaping the benefits: more daylight. But that will come to an end at 2 a.m. on Sunday, November 5, when we will "fall back," bringing in early sunsets and more darkness for the winter (and yes, an extra hour of sleep that night!)

Under the Uniform Time Act of 1966, states can choose not to observe daylight saving time. In January, a proposal to move Virginia to year-round daylight saving time failed in the state Senate. That means, Virginia, like most states, continues to observe daylight saving time from March to November. The U.S. Senate voted to end the biannual tradition and make daylight saving time permanent in March 2022, but the legislation stalled in the U.S. House.

10 TIPS TO WINTERIZE YOUR HOME

When the temperature begins to drop, consider these maintenance and end-of-season tasks that will help you winterize your home and protect your property.

- **1. Check the gutters.** Prevent ice dams by cleaning out your gutters, installing gutter guards and making sure your attic floor is properly insulated.
- **2. Protect the pipes.** Protect against frozen pipes by insulating those that could be susceptible to freezing.
- **3. Seal the cracks.** Caulk holes and openings around windows, doors, air conditioners and mail chutes to help prevent cold air from seeping in.
- **4. Stop the slips, trips and falls.** Keep driveways and sidewalks clear of ice and snow and repair any issues with steps and handrails. Keeping deicing salt handy for sprinkling on steps, sidewalks and your driveway.
- **5. Install an emergency release.** Consider installing an emergency pressure release valve in your plumbing system. This protects against increased pressure caused by freezing pipes and can prevent them from bursting. Learn how to shut the water off and know where your pipes are located.
- **6. Keep it cozy.** Set your thermostat to at least 65 degrees Fahrenheit and make sure your home is well-insulated. Install an energy efficient or programmable thermostat.
- **7. Have your heating system checked.** Furnaces, boilers and chimneys should be serviced at least once a year to keep them running efficiently.
- **8. Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.** Check monthly and replace batteries as needed. Consider installing a carbon monoxide detector to avoid inadvertently trapping the toxic gas in your home.
- **9. Clear the yard.** Keep the trees trimmed and remove dead branches and debris from your yard. Ice, snow and wind can cause weak branches to fall.
- **10. House the hose.** Drain and store away garden hoses. Shut off exterior faucet valves. Turn the water off completely if you're planning to be away. Have a friend check your home regularly.

Most home insurance policies cover damages due to extreme winter weather, but make sure you speak with your independent agent to answer any questions you have about your specific homeowners, condo or renters' insurance policy.

FALL IS THE BEST TIME TO SEED AND FEED YOUR LAWN

Fall isn't just for festivals and picking apples. It's also the best time to seed and fertilize your lawn. One of the trickiest parts of growing grass is ensuring the seeds stay moist until they germinate. Cooler Fall temperatures make it a little easier to ensure those budding seeds stay moist. If you have a hard time keeping up with watering, but want to try reseeding again, Seeds.com suggests using a product which expands, in addition to the grass seed, to retain more moisture from waterings to ensure seeds don't dry out. If the target area is small (like the area between the sidewalk and curb) there are patch and repair type grass products that offer pre-mixed seed and moisture control together in one bag.

Beware of Anti-freeze:

Ingesting antifreeze is lethal to both humans and animals. Unfortunately, both cats and dogs have been known to lick this sweet tasting substance. Check your car for leaks of this sweet tasting substance and make sure all bottles are stored.

Update their ID tags: The changing of seasons is a great time to check your pet ID tags and microchip. If you do happen to have a pet go missing in the fall, they will be more likely to suffer effects of the cold environment.

Beware of ticks: It is tick season and play ing in the cool autumn leaves is one of the many ways your pet could get them. Be sure to regularly check your pets for ticks.

Be careful with holiday treats:

The four most common food-related Halloween hazards for pets are chocolate, candy overindulgence, raisins and candy wrappers. If you think your pet ingested something they shouldn't have, call your vet immediately or the Animal Poison Control hotline immediately.
