Christmas Tree Pickup

UNDECORATED Christmas trees will be picked up with trash **ONLY** January 2 and 9. Please do **NOT** dispose of the trees in the woods.



Please don't put out food for animals. They are searching more actively in winter but they could end up inside your home or take up residence in your rear yard.

Snow Plowing & Sand

Snow plowing will occur at 3" and sand will be spread as needed.

Keep It Cleared

Don't block the mailbox area with your garbage/recycle cans.

When It Snows....

Keep the snow cleared in front of your **storm door** to make sure you are able to open it.

Snow Shovel Storage

Please do not store your snow shovel on the front porch. Sometimes it "grows legs and walks off." Then what do you do the next time it snows? And it's so out of place in the Spring when it doesn't get put away.

New Architectural Control Committee Members

Are you looking for an opportunity to make a positive impact in your community? The Architectural Control Committee (ACC) may be for you! We meet once per month, and our main responsibility is to ensure that any exterior changes that a homeowner requests are reviewed to ensure that they are in compliance with the Loft Ridge HOA guidelines. In the Spring, we inspect all townhouses, looking for maintenance issues or changes that are not in compliance. Homeowners are then notified in writing of any violations and given ninety days to correct the maintenance issues and/or request approval of unapproved changes. The ACC's mission is to ensure we continue to live in an attractive and well-maintained community.

We also recommend guideline changes to the Board, usually based on several homeowners suggesting them or to comply with a new law. When approved, the updates are mailed to each homeowner and also posted on the Loft Ridge website.

The Committee members are your neighbors who have volunteered because we want to keep Loft Ridge the beautiful community that it is. Additional members are needed and welcomed. Board News

Contracts for **management**, **grounds maintenance** and **snow plowing and sanding** were renewed. **Irrigation systems** were winterized and **tree removal/pruning and stump grinding** was performed.

Aeration, overseeding and **mulching** were done. November saw the first **leaf removal**; the second is scheduled for December after the last leaves have fallen. The **audit** was completed with no issues.

The Board is in contact with the HOA attorney exploring our options regarding short-term rentals.

Winter "Useful Hints"

- If you didn't drain your outside water lines before the first freeze, you might want to do that now to avoid burst pipes.

- Remember to change your furnace filter.
- Cooking spray on your shovel will prevent snow from sticking.
- Hand sanitizer on your car door key might make it easier to insert.
- How about some tube socks for your wipers to make future snow easier to remove.

Rose Hill Drive Markings

Rose Hill has been remarked to allow for a separate bicycle lane. To remind yourself how to safely turn into the shopping center, access "Driver's Guide to Bike Lanes in Fairfax County" at www.fairfaxcounty.gov.

Tree Branches

When you trim or thin your trees and trim or remove bushes, please bag the material so it will be collected by the County. Simply putting items in a pile on the ground near a collection spot doesn't do the trick.

Snow and Your Trash Can

This time of year it is more important to have your cans out for as short a time as possible. Out after 5 Tuesday and in by dark Wednesday. They can freeze in place, making it difficult to move, and the snowplow has to maneuver around them.

Remember if weather is severe, the County trucks may not collect on schedule but assume they will.

Snow and Shrub Survival

When removing snow from shrubs, use a broom and sweep in an upward motion to avoid breaking branches.

Vehicle Vandalism

It's getting darker earlier so it's more important to **keep your porch lights on** to illuminate the parking spaces and **lock your vehicles.** All homeowners who have reported break-ins via Group email have indicated their vehicles were unlocked.

Locked or not, report any incidences to the police non-emergency number. Their



patrolling areas are impacted by activity.

Stuck or Tires Spinning?

In either case, it's better to keep the gas light but steady while jiggling the steering wheel. If you floor it, over-torqued tires will melt snow (which will then refreeze), making it harder to get moving. And if the car suddenly gains traction, you can lose control.

For 2018-2019 winter forecasts are for lots (20+") of snow. One forecast says coldest weather will be in January and February with a "memorable" snow of 10+" in February.



We're off to a wintry start with 1.4" of snow and sleet on November 15 which was the first measurable snowfall since 1996 and the biggest in the month since 1989.

Animals, Birds and Your Trash

Food is scarce in the winter. **Please** don't set your trash out early or in white trash bags. Once animals/birds find your "trash deposit spot" has bags they can chew into, they will return (not just on trash day). *Be considerate of your neighbors and the appearance of our Community*, and place your trash out in cans or heavyweight black bags after 5pm on Tuesday.

And if you are one of those who is using a recycle

bin, rather than the blue can, remember that any food or liquid left in your cans and bottles is an attractive nuisance to animals who might carry disease. Pizza boxes have food residue and are not recyclable but they are tasty!!



Weather "Alerts"

<u>Warning</u> – Conditions for snow event (heavy snow, heavy sleet, ice storm, blowing snow or any combination) expected in next 12-36 hours.

<u>Watch</u> – Same as warning with time frame of 24-72 hours.

<u>Advisory</u> – Same as warning but less snow or ice.

<u>Wind Chill Advisory</u> – within 12-36 hours temperatures can reach or exceed -15 below
